There were approximately 11 persons present in the audience.

The Company's receipt of any future notice of intent to terminate from the City will result in termination of the existing Franchise Agreement at the end of the Franchise Agreement's anniversary date (i.e. April 27th) proposed by the City as the date of termination, provided that, in selecting a date of termination to occur, the City must select an anniversary date of the Franchise Agreement that is on or later than the two-year anniversary of the Company's receipt of the notice of intent to terminate from the City. Provided, however, if City provides written notice of intent to terminate on or prior to April 27, 2020, the City may select a termination date on or later than April 27, 2021.

City Manager Molinari announced that the City received a Certificate of

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Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association, recognizing Amy Risher, Finance Director, and her staff. This is the 7th year in a row that the City has received this designated and he wanted to recognize Amy and her staff for all of their work.

 Plan to Improve Diversity in Police Department - Police Chief Wade Marvin and Deputy Chief Kevin Martin

Police Chief Wade Marvin addressed Council to give highlights of his new plan for diversity hiring, recruitment and retention of employees.

Some of the points he made were as follows:

- a. The Walterboro Police Department is committed to hiring, retaining and promoting a diverse group of individuals whose goal is to exhibit the image of a professional law enforcement agency, while serving the citizens and visitors of Walterboro.
- b. The Police Department has increased its standards to mirror those of the S.C. Criminal Justice Academy, as well as increase our quality of service. As a result, based on academic standards, background, psychological and polygraph test, we have denied employment to several applicants of all races.
- c. What we are currently doing:
 - A significant effort has been made to enlist the help of leaders in the minority community - ministers, civil rights groups, teachers, business leaders (Black and Hispanic), people we have personal relationships with, Veterans Affairs Office, and the Hispanic Outreach Ministry.
 - Post High School Initiatives:
 - OC Tech (Orangeburg) Job Fair, and reached out to instructors for recommendations. TCL Beaufort, spoke with Criminal Justice Academic Advisor about potential applicants. CSU attended Job fair and met with Criminal Justice students. USC Salk began internship with Criminal Justice students, met with advisors and students.
 - Employee Continuing Educational Seminars/Conferences
 Chief Marvin Chiefs Conference 2016, 2017, 2018 Best Hiring Practices.

Deputy Chief Martin - 2016 Background Investigator's Seminar.

- 2018 Recruiting for Law Enforcement Seminar.
- 2019 Recruiting and Retention Strategies.

Administrators - SCLEOA seminars on issues related to recruiting and retention of officers, SCCIA "Racial Intelligence, Training and Engagement.

 "Ladder of Success", a comprehensive plan linking increased compensation to additional training and certifications. This will help us realize our goal of building and retaining a professional, diverse agency that is reflective of the community.

Mayor Young thanked Chief Marvin for this information.

3. <u>Consideration of Recommendation to Purchase New Pickup Truck for Water</u>
<u>Department</u>

City Manager Molinari stated that there is capacity in the 2018-2019 Enterprise Fund budget to absorb the cost of one (1) pickup truck for the Water Department. The Water Department would like to replace a 2008 Ford Ranger pickup that has 198,442

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miles and has required numerous repairs in the past six (6) months. Three bids were received by the City as follows:

Mr. Molinari stated that staff recommends purchasing a 2019 Ford F-150 from Walterboro Ford (Walterboro, SC), the low bidder, in the amount of \$24,380.00.

A motion was made by Council Member Siegel to accept the low bid from Walterboro Ford (Walterboro, SC) in the amount of \$24,380.00 to purchase a new pickup truck for the Water Department. Council Member Pryor seconded the motion. All in favor. None opposed. Motion carried.

4. Recommendation to Award Contract to Corbett and Sons Construction, LLC to Install 1,178 Linear Feet of 8" Water Main on Washington Street

City Manager Molinari told Council that on May 8, 2019 the City received six (6) bids for the Washington Street Waterline Improvement Project. This project consists of constructing 1,178 linear feet of 8" water main from Dowling Avenue to Ivanhoe Road, three (3) gate valves, one (1) fire hydrant and related appurtenances. Approximately 350 feet of water main will be bored under Ireland Creek. The bids received for this project were as follows:

Mr. Molinari stated that Corbett and Sons Construction, LLC (Lancaster, SC) was the low bidder with a bid of \$114,030.00. Pursuant to a memorandum from the City's engineer (Hybrid Engineering), Corbett and Sons Construction, LLC is both qualified and capable of performing this project. Mr. Molinari also stated that the funding for the project would come from the Capital Project Sales Tax.

A motion was made by Council Member Brown to award the contract to Corbett and Sons Construction, LLC, in the amount of \$114,030.00 to install 1,178 Linear Feet of 8" Water Main on Washington Street. Council Member Broderick seconded the motion that passed unanimously.

There being a quorum present, Mayor Young called the meeting to order and invited everyone to join in the invocation and the pledge of allegiance. The Mayor then gave the invocation and Council Member Carl Brown led the pledge of allegiance to our flag.

PUBLIC INPUT ON AGENDA ITEMS:

There were no public comments or questions on agenda items.

PUBLIC HEARING:

The Mayor then opened a public hearing, duly advertised, to receive public comments or questions on the following proposed ordinance:

Ordinance # 2019-10, An Ordinance to Add Article XII (Loitering) to Chapter
 20 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Walterboro, SC

City Manager Molinari then recognized Public Chief Wade Marvin to brief Council on the proposed ordinance.

Chief Marvin then addressed Council. He stated that in the United States, the crime of loitering is most commonly an ordinance in cities and towns, rather than state law. The purpose of the loitering ordinance and statutes is to enable law enforcement to take action aimed at reducing such activities as disturbing the peace, solicitation or prostitution, aggressive vagrant or panhandling, public drunkenness and drug dealing within front of or near public places. Earlier ordinances and statutes sought to punish people caught loitering more seriously than today. This is because there were legal challenges brought over the years causing changes in the way loitering is handled. Law enforcement officers often make a distinction between loitering with no intent to do harm and loitering with the intent to commit a crime or cause a threat to public safety.

Concluding, Chief Marvin said, we will be very careful in how we enforce this ordinance, but I think it is necessary for the local businesses. It's another tool that we can have in our belts to help enforce the laws and keep our streets safe.

The Mayor then said, the public hearing is opened, are there any comments or questions about this ordinance from the public? No comments or questions were raised and the public hearing was closed.

Resolution # 2019-R-09, a Resolution to Create the City of Walterboro 2020
 Complete Count Committee

The Mayor announced that Mr. Michael Kroll of the U.S. Census Bureau was present at the meeting tonight.

The Mayor then read the resolution in its entirety into the record. This resolution establishes a 2020 Complete Count Committee and states that the members of this committee will be comprised of the members of the Municipal Planning Commission and the City Appearance Board. Also, the Mayor may appoint additional members to the committee as necessary to achieve an accurate count. The Complete Count Committee will work with the Census Bureau and the State of South Carolina to strive for an accurate count.

A motion was made by Council Member Siegel to approve Resolution # 2019-R-09 as submitted. Council Member Broderick seconded the motion that passed with all members voting in favor. A copy of said resolution is attached as part of these minutes.

The Mayor said, this is really important to the City of Walterboro, and we are going to be working hard to get everybody to help us get an accurate count - make sure that everybody is counted.

Mr. Kroll expressed his thanks for the help.

Resolution # 2019-R-10, A Resolution Authorizing the City of Walterboro to
Act as the Sponsor for a Grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation
Federal Aviation Administration for the Benefit of the Lowcountry Regional
Airport and Adopt the Application for the Grant as Its Own, Accept the Grant
Agreement and Other Matters Related Thereto

City Manager Molinari stated that the Airport was awarded a \$3,417,832.00 grant to put in some drainage improvements in the air field. The drainage for the air field was original put in during the 1940s and 1950s and is in dire need of replacement. The Airport was successful in securing funds and when we were doing the paperwork, the City was listed as a sponsor. Typically, when we have grants at the Airport, either the County is listed as a sponsor or the City and sometimes both. In this case, the City was listed as the sponsor. There will be no matching requirement from the City of Walterboro. So, there won't be any out-of-pocket expenses for the City. The City Attorney drafted this resolution. The paperwork arrived last Monday, and was signed off on by the Mayor and the City Attorney, but we need to adopt this resolution formally approving the funds, as we are the sponsor of the grant.

Mayor Young then said, when the package came in, we had less than two (2) days to get the signatures and return it, so that's 3.4 million dollars we have gotten for the Airport.

A motion was made by Council Member Siegel to approve Resolution # 2019-R-10, a Resolution Authorizing the City of Walterboro to Act as the Sponsor for a Grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Aviation Administration for the Benefit of the Lowcountry Regional Airport. Council Member Pryor seconded the motion that passed unanimously. A copy of said resolution is attached as part of these minutes.

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3. **Proclamation # 2019-05**, A Proclamation to Honor the South Carolina Artisans Center on its 25th Anniversary

Next, the Mayor called Ms. Kristin Mumford, Director of the South Carolina Artisans Center to the podium. He then read Proclamation # 2019-05 in its entirety into the record, and presented a copy to Ms. Mumford. This proclamation states that the SC Artisans Center was established on October 10, 1994 by Mary Hunt, Denise Simmons and Carol Mullis, and is now celebrating its 25th anniversary.

The Mayor also thanked Ms. Mumford for the pictures around the wall in this room (displayed by the Artisans Center). He said, we really are enjoying them and they really add to Council Chambers.

A motion was made by Council Member Bridge to approve Proclamation # 2019-05, a Proclamation to Honor the South Carolina Artisans Center on its 25th Anniversary. Council Member Broderick seconded the motion that passed with all members voting in favor. A copy of said proclamation is attached as part of these minutes.

At this point, the Mayor said, Denise Simmons was my next door neighbor and I remember her coming over one day and saying, 'What would you think about us trying to have an Artisans Center in Walterboro, like they have in North Carolina or Asheville? So, never underestimate the power of one person who has a dream. He also stated that the City has been greatly involved in the Artisans Center from its inception in helping financially and in other ways.

Also, under New Business, the following agenda items were approved by motion as follows:

- 4. A request to close Lucas Street Between Hampton and Carn Streets on November 2, 2019 for the 150 Year Anniversary Celebration of the Walterboro Fire Department from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. by Fire Chief Paul Seigler. Fire Chief Seigler invited everyone to come out and join the big family event to celebrate the 150-year anniversary of the Walterboro Fire Department. Motion to approve this request was made by Council Member Pryor and seconded by Council Member Broderick. All in favor, None opposed, motion carried.
- 5. A request to close Walter Street between Washington and Wichman Streets on November 7, 2019 for a Fund-raising Event, which is part of First Thursday, by the Colleton County Arts Council, Kim Bridge, Director. A motion to approve this request was made by Council Member Siegel, seconded by Council Member Bridge and passed unanimously. Ms. Kim Bridge was present and told Council that they had just finished "Alice in Wonderland." We had 104 kids in our performance, so we really need this building in order to store the costumes, to sew the costumes and to wash the costumes. So, this is actually a fund-raiser. She invited everyone to come out and support this fund-raiser.

Council Member Bridge then said, I wonder if you have talked to Christan Spires so that it's part of the street, and it's not stuck down on the other end. Ms. Kim Bridge responded that she had already spoken to Christan before the request was put in.



II. Narrative:

The "SC Artisans Center 25th Anniversary" campaign is a strategy not only to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the center but to entice visitors to visit the SC Artisans Center as a stop on their travels to SC and choose Walterboro as an overnight stay. The South Carolina Artisans Center is the largest single tourist attraction located in Walterboro. We are requesting \$4380.00 to fund an ad campaign to support our events that are being held at the Center and local historic venues in celebration and recognition of the SC Artisans Center presence in Walterboro for 25 years. II. Narrative

On Friday, March 20th and Saturday, March 21st 2020, Coastal Electric Cooperative's community assistance program, the Coastal Electric Trust Incorporated (501(c) (3) organization), is planning to co-host Smoke in the 'Boro, a South Carolina Barbeque Association (SCBA) Cook-Off. As the previous six years, the event will be held at Coastal Electric's Outback facility on Jefferies Boulevard. Power, water, parking, and the use of the Outback building for the competition judging will again make this the ideal location. We are most fortunate to have such an ongoing and collaborative partnership.

We are also fortunate to have this event with the assistance and guidance of Wayne Keith, a SCBA-certified barbeque judge, who developed *Smoke in the 'Boro* in 2014. He participates during the year in a number of cook-offs as a judge and as a member of a

cooking team. He and his family owned and operated Keith's Barbeque in in various locations in Walterboro from 1949 until 1992. Based on his lifetime of experience in the barbeque world, Mr. Keith is an SCBA Master Judge. His reputation and position make him uniquely qualified to recruit cookers, judges, and sponsors, and to spread the word about our events.

This will again be a family weekend event, offering live music on both days and a separate area on Saturday for local churches to sell baked goods. There will also be a Cruise-In car show on Saturday, which has been a popular edition since 2015. This feature attracts an additional and diverse audience population. The Cub Scouts will have their Pinewood Derby, the Girl Scouts will sell their cookies and there will be other activities for children.

Based on the success of and experience gained from our first six Smoke in the 'Boro events, this year will also feature two separate cook-offs. Friday night will again be an "Anything Butt" night. Cooking teams will prepare entries of their choice - from chicken wings to seafood to desserts. The cookers will provide their own food for this segment of the competition. As we have each year, we will have 25-35 local citizens and leaders serving as judges, evaluating and ranking the entries in a blind tasting. The winners will be announced and prizes awarded on Saturday afternoon.

On Saturday, the main cook-off for the best barbequed Boston Butt and ribs (a rib throw-down!) will take place. The cookers will prepare their pork during the previous night, and submit their (blind) entries to the judges on Saturday morning. Based on the number of cook-off participants, 50 -75 judges, SCBA-certified and novice level, will assess the entries. The judges will be under the direction of Grand Marshal, Dawn Verbarg, of Hanahan, SC. For the 2019 Smoke in the 'Boro, 74 of these judges came to Walterboro from around the state, and as far away as N. Augusta, Calabash, NC and Mauldin. Both days will be conducted in accordance with SCBA requirements and guidelines. All participants will know those requirements in advance.

In March of 2019, thirty certified teams from all areas of the state (e.g. Lexington, Greenville, Sumter, Little River, North Augusta, Blythewood and Goose Creek), as well as from Marshville and Clayton, NC and Belmont, CA entered. Many new and repeating local county cookers also competed. We expect many of the same returning teams and again some new entrants for our 2019 event. Based on participation in the last five years, we estimate that 30-40 cooking teams will enter for 2020. Each team will pay an entry fee of \$150 to \$200, depending on the date of registration. Prizes for the top five will consist of a trophy (modeled after the Red Rocker logo) and cash ranging from \$150 to \$1,200. We again look for participation from all over the Southeast and encourage and welcome local entrants.

For the Friday and Saturday events, we will once again have the larger venue, increased for the March, 2018 Smoke in the 'Boro to include 2 entrance gates, more parking, and additional space to accommodate more cookers and improve logistics. The public will purchase tickets for \$1.00 each to taste the food of their choice. Soft drinks, water, beer and wine will be available each day with payment in the form of the \$1.00 tickets. Sales of alcoholic beverages will be controlled through the ticket process. Only one glass of beer or wine can be purchased at a time. Permits for the sale of beer and wine will be obtained as required. Pepsico of Jedberg has donated soft drinks and water each year. Southern Eagle often donates cups. We will be working with those vendors again, and hope to be as fortunate in 2020.

The budget attached to this application is based on experience from the last six years. The Colleton Civic Center and Coastal Electric are requesting \$10,000 from ATAX funds to cover out of town advertising costs, port-o-lets, printing and distribution of information. Printing will cover such items as posters, postcards, and banners used to promote the event at out-of-county locations. Advertising, which has already begun on the SCBA website, will continue through the local print media, additional websites, and, with funding from ATAX, through newspapers in such areas as Columbia, Orangeburg, Aiken, Beaufort, and the Charleston, Monck's Corner and Summerville areas - as many publications with as wide a range as possible. We will advertise again in BBQ Times, a national magazine. Over the years, other publications have noticed our ads and called to request ads for their publications as well. As funding allows, these new placement locales are evaluated for possible use.

It is expected that attendees this year will again be equally divided between locals and cook-off fans from a fifty to 200 mile radius around Walterboro, including some from out of state. The SCBA events have a loyal following from all over the state and the southeast region. Together with Coastal Electric we strive to make our event the best in the barbeque world.

III. Benefit to Tourism

The barbeque world is highly competitive, with a loyal following. Because this is a two day event, visitors, judges, and some participants will stay in local hotels and B&Bs. For the six previous year's events, several attendees, judges and participants and their families stayed in local accommodations, in order to attend both days' events. The 2020 BBQ will be yet another opportunity to attract people to Colleton County for a positive and popular event, provide them with two days of fun, food, and festivities, and entice them to come back for other events. Our six years of Smoke in the 'Boro have shed a positive light on Walterboro, and we hear from our feedback – cookers and attendees alike - who feel that Walterboro's BBQ event is one of the best in the state. SCBA volunteers, judges and cookers are helpful and valuable visitors to our area, and they are critical in spreading the good news about our community and events.

IV. Benefit to the Community

Our community benefits from this event in a number of ways: 1) there is an economic benefit for local businesses – hotels/motels, B&B's, restaurants, gas stations, etc., – benefiting from sales to participants and attendees; 2) supplies for the event, from paper goods to meat for the cookers, are purchased from local businesses; 3) local residents who wish to try their hand at competitive cooking have the opportunity to do so in their own community; and 4) the event gives everyone an opportunity to enjoy a family-friendly weekend with great variety. This will be a positive, neighborly event, featuring good food, good music, and good spirited competition, typical of life in Colleton County.

V. Tracking

The cookers will provide their addresses, as will the judges. As with the six prior years we will canvas attendees to find out where they are from and how they heard about the event. For our planning purposes, we are estimating that at least 1,500 – 2,000 people will attend the Colleton Cook-Off during the two-day event. We will track attendance numbers through head count estimates, ticket sales and collection, and food and drink consumption. The numbers for our 2019 event were impressive. We hosted 28 competitive cookers and 65 SCBA judges. General attendance for Friday was approximately 800, and for Saturday, 780. Canvassing at both days' events indicated approximately 300 visitors from areas outside of Colleton County and several from outside of South Carolina (North Carolina, Georgia and Florida) who attended with family members and friends to enjoy and learn about the event.

VI Duration of Project

Smoke in the 'Boro Barbeque Cook-Off will take place on Friday, March 20th (5:30 p.m. – 8 p.m., through Saturday, March 21st, 11 a.m. - 2 p.m., 2020.

VII Permits

Beer/wine permits, any required DHEC permits, and any permissions for banner display or signage will be obtained prior to the event. Event insurance for the 2 days will also be purchased.

VIII Additional Comments

The barbeque cook-off is the type of event that gains momentum through success and by word of mouth. Since 2014, *Smoke in the 'Boro* has become an annual event for Colleton County, with each year showing an increase in competitors, visitors and popularity.

Operation Round Up® is a Coastal Electric Cooperative community service assistance program governed and executed by Coastal Electric Trust, Inc., a 501(c) (3) corporation. Contributions to Coastal Electric Trust are used to assist local individuals or families with special needs or requests. These needs include but are not limited to food, shelter, clothing, healthcare, education and accessibility needs. Funds, once approved, are used to pay bills or for services directly and are never given to the individual or family making the request. Coastal Electric Trust has been an active service provider in the community for over 20 years.

A secondary non-profit will be identified as a co-host for the event. Recent changes is the status of the Colleton Civic Center (October 1) are prohibiting us from including the Civic Center as a co-host. Therefore another non-profit will be identified within the month.

II PROJECT NARRATIVE:

A. General Description:

The Lowcountry Tourism Commission is one of eleven similar programs across the State designated by SC-PRT and created by the General Assembly. The Commission's primary mission is the stimulation of economic growth and the development of the area's tourism industry through regional tourism promotional activities. We have implemented an award-winning, professional tourism promotion program for Walterboro and the surrounding area for over 28 years. We support the City of Walterboro and her community by working cooperatively with the Tourism Director and Chamber President, who serve on our Board of Commissioners. Past projects include the Fireball Rally, Familiarization Tours with the SC PRT Welcome Center Managers, Familiarization Tours with our Congressional Legislative Delegation, an upcoming NYC Travel Writers Familiarization Tour at the end of this month and hotel rooms for the Wounded Warrior Hunts. We also provided the city with photography and video footage at no cost to your tourism program.

B. Benefit to Tourism:

The Commission benefits tourism in Walterboro and the surrounding region through an integrated marketing campaign which includes our website, social media outlets, national & regional advertising, personal contact and international distribution of promotional literature which lists Walterboro hotels, restaurants, historic sites, etc. The Commission also serves as a local fulfillment agency - responding to requests generated by advertising placed by PRT and the Commission for travel & tourism information. The Lowcountry Visitors Center in the historic Frampton Plantation House is located just off on I-95 at Exit 33 (Point South). SC Department of Transportation reports that 9,900 vehicles per day travel Highway 17 North past our driveway. Seven days a week, we provide guidance and information to travelers and vacationers and encourage tourists to visit Walterboro and its attractions. Our website and social media outlets freely promote the tourism business in the City twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

C. Benefit to Community:

A growing industry in Walterboro is tourism and service-related employment. Benefits include: wider exposure, attraction of more visitors needing accommodations and services - thereby creating more jobs, increased sales and revenues. We send visitors to Walterboro 7-days-per-week from our Visitors Center on I-95.

D. Tracking:

From our most recent Conversion Study, Survey Monkey reported that the average spend of our study was \$1,022 (a bit higher than the PRT reported average spend of \$958). In calculating the information provided by those who returned the survey, we had an overall conversion rate of 46% (55% through web leads). By using the number of Guidebooks and Attractions Brochures requested from our office in FY 18/19, we can conclude from the results of this study that our Commission produces a direct expenditure of \$13,990,158 from the trips taken by those who receive our Lowcountry Guidebook and Attractions Brochure:

29,758 Collateral Pieces X 46% visits to the SC Lowcountry = 13,689 13,689 visits X \$1,022 average spend during vacation = \$13,990,158

This figure is quite conservative because it does not include those visitors who do not request our guidebook but download our information from our website or through digital and social media outlets. That number can be highly subjective but is very powerful as our digital presence was the reason we still had a 31.4% increase in total attendance while suffering a 10.9% decrease in foot traffic and collateral material distribution.

With respect to the City of Walterboro's piece of the economic impact of our results, we calculate that we will have brought 6,571 room nights to Walterboro in FY 18/19 year. Walterboro was reported as the destination of the traveler in 50.2% of those completing the survey, the highest ranked destination in the region. With 29,758 Guidebooks and brochures dispersed and 46% actually making a trip to the Lowcountry, that gives us 13,689 visiting parties. Of that, 10% reported Walterboro as their destination – 1,369 visiting parties staying an average of 4.8 nights = 6,571 room nights. Again, this does NOT include those receiving our

information via our web site, events newsletter, attractions brochure or social media outlets. Also, these figures are direct impact only. They do not include indirect revenue created by our local citizens who are employed by the tourism industry, by the vendors who supply goods to the industry or sales tax or hospitality taxes which are collected from those visiting guests.

The latest Hilton Head Island Visitor Profile, conducted by the University of South Carolina Beaufort through the research team at the Lowcountry and Resort Islands Tourism Institute under the direction of Dr. John Salazar, reported an economic spend of \$1,303 with an average stay of 4.8 nights in the Hotel Lodging Segment. Therefore, we feel that our research is appropriate with respect to average spend and length of stay. We will again conduct our own Conversion Study in the fall of this year.

In FY 2018/2019, we were in direct contact with 43,921 guests and visitors who have requested our printed materials: 26,776 Guldebooks distributed + 2,982 Attractions Brochures distributed + 14,163 Guests at the Visitors Center. This is a 10.9% decrease in this set of numbers over last year. This is a common trend in our industry with most visitors getting their information online.

Our online presence touched 212,102 viewers (at least once): 173,505 Web sessions (up 46.4% from the previous year) + 25,644 vetted and active Constant Contact email recipients (up 48% from the previous year) + 11,226 Facebook likes (up 37.6% from the previous year) + 1,447 Twitter followers (up 9.0% from the previous year) + 280 Instagram followers (up 28% from the previous year). This does not include our followers on Pinterest because we have not been as active there in concert with industry trends. However, Pinterest analytics report that we had an audience of 21k and showed the top 6 metros as Charlotte, Atlanta, New York, Greenville/Spartanburg/Asheville, Dallas/Ft Worth and Los Angeles.

43,921 + 212,102 = 256,023. This is 31.4% higher than the total "attendance" from last year, measured the exact same way, and is predominately due to our increased online presence. Our goal is to persist in our efforts optimizing each of our platforms in the marketing mix to increase visitation particularly through our website SEO and digital marketing during FY 2019/2020.

Total "tourist" anticipated: While some of our social media followers are in the four-county region, the vast majority of dollars spent in our marketing efforts are in placements far beyond the 50-mile radius. Therefore, we consider these potential guests as "tourists".

We continue to measure our effectiveness through ongoing conversion studies, our monthly reports which determine ROI respective to media outlets, through collaboration with regional Chambers and City Tourism offices in guest profile studies and in conjunction with the Lowcountry & Resort Islands Tourism Institute and USCB. Our monthly reports track response to advertising across all platforms, guests that stop at the Frampton Plantation House, website traffic through Google Analytics and other tracking reports in Facebook, Constant Contact, Pinterest and Twitter. We also use the tools provided through SC Parks, Recreation and Tourism and the Southeastern Tourism Society to keep abreast of the newest

technology, upcoming trends and ever-changing ways to better reach our target market and influence travelers to choose Walterboro as their next destination.

Project/Event Description (narrative)

Olympians and professional cycling champions will compete in the 18th annual Walterboro Criterium on April 29, 2020.

The series is made up of four person teams, competing in multi-lap races in a closed circuit of about half a mile long. This racing discipline requires a unique type of rider, one who must demonstrate top speed and bike handling skills traveling at 30 mph. Because of the circular track, criteriums are the cycling equivalent to NASCAR and are known as America's contribution to the sport. To establish the track needed for the riders, we will obtain permission to close several streets in the downtown area for the race.

The Walterboro Criterium is coordinated by a group of local volunteers that represent several of the local organizations, local businesses, and interested citizens. We shortened the track at the request of the event organizers, which made the event more exciting and fast paced. The start/finish line was also moved to Hampton Street and the VIP section has been expanded to include live music, as well as a televised viewing station for other parts of the track.

Last year, our VIP section served more than 300 guests with the addition of a catered dinner, and 60 children from ages 3-10 participated in our children's race.

Three teams also stayed in Walterboro prior to the event to do demonstrations for our local schools and bring interest and awareness to the students.

Benefit to Tourism and/or the Community

The popularity of cycling has been on the rise in recent years. Races are now staged all over the country and fans are more than willing to travel to watch them.

Walterboro is no exception, giving Walterboro international visibility, as well as additional press coverage. The races are filmed as well as live streamed with an internet hot spot connection. This enables friends and families of racers all over the world to view the progress of their team. The numbers of tourists participating in this series increases significantly each year due to the additional advertising, extended stay hotel discount packages and the continuation of the amateur and women races.

Tourists and racers stay in the local hotels, eat in our restaurants, and shop in several of the retail outlets. Visitors are charmed by the quaint downtown atmosphere and are encouraged to return by merchants and event staff. Many of our downtown merchants merchants stay open due to the extra business and increased foot traffic.

The 2019 USC CRITS Cycling Series brought a total of 169 amateur, pro and master riders to Colleton County. We estimate that approximately 75 hotel room nights were utilized by the riders, event staff, and visitors. This event also contributes to Walterboro's busiest restaurant and coffee service of the year.

This annual event has given Walterboro a reputation as a cycling community, with several other cycling events in the community such as the Tour de Lowcountry and FestiVelo.







Willis Blvd. capable of yielding more than 1,000 gallons per minute. The project will increase the volume and pressure of the water supplied to the surrounding area and will enhance fire protection capabilities.

The City's engineer, Hybrid Engineering has evaluated the experience of the bidders and found the low bidder, Pinholster Construction, LLC (Savannah, GA) to be qualified and capable of performing the project. Staff recommends awarding the contract to Pinholster Construction, LLC in the amount of \$1,257,897.10. The City was awarded a \$1 million grant from the South Carolina Rural Infrastructure Authority for the project. The City's share is \$257,897.10. Pinholster Construction has agreed to allow the City of Walterboro to subcontract the clearing of the project site which will save approximately \$40,000. The savings will be addressed as a deductive change order once the project has been awarded. The City's share of the project (\$217,897.10) will be absorbed into the Enterprise Fund budget and will be reconciled with a budget amendment at the end of the 2019-2020 fiscal year. City staff requests City Council's favorable consideration of the request.

The City of Walterboro's Utilities Department accepted bids on October 15, 2019 for installation and construction of a deep water well capable of yielding greater than 1,000 gallons per minute. This well will be located on Mable T. Willis Blvd. This project will increase both the volume and pressure of the water supplied to the surrounding area as well as improve the fire protection capabilities.

The City received bids from three (3) contractors with a low bid of \$1,257,897.10.

Our engineering representatives at Hybrid Engineering have evaluated the construction experience of the bidders and found that the lowest bidder, Pinholster Construction, LLC has provided evidence of both experience and resources that would allow them to complete the project. It is therefore our recommendation to award this contract to Pinholster Construction, LLC in the amount of \$1,257,897.10.

The City of Walterboro received a \$1,000,000.00 grant from the Rural Infrastructure Authority for this project. The City of Walterboro's obligation would be \$257,897.10. Pinholster Construction has agreed to allow the City of Walterboro to clear the project site in order to save approximately \$40,000.00. This would be addressed as a deductive change order once the project has been awarded.

As you know, the bid opening for the Mable T. Willis Boulevard Well was conducted at 2 p.m. on October 15, 2019, at Walterboro City Hall there in Walterboro. There were 3 bids received and opened. A copy of the Bid Tabulation is enclosed. All bids were found to be responsive.

Pinholster Construction LLC, dba PINCO, was the low bidder with a base bid price of \$1,165,174.90. We are of the opinion that this is a fair and reasonable price for this work. Casing and screen would be 10-inch and design production would be 625 gallons per minute (GPM) or 600,000 gallons per day (GPD) based on maximum 16-hour usage per day. Use of 10-inch casing and screen would likely not be large enough to accommodate the pump needed to increase production to the historical maximum safe yield of 1,300 GPM. We have also received bids on four (4) alternate items of work.

Based on our review of their qualifications and consultations with references, we are of the opinion that Pinholster Construction LLC, dba PINCO, is both qualified and capable of performing the Mable T. Willis Boulevard Well. Accordingly, Hybrid Engineering, Inc. recommends that a construction contract be awarded to Pinholster Construction LLC, dba PINCO. With consideration of alternate bid items and understanding the City's desire that this well produce as much water as the aquifer can safely yield, Hybrid Engineering, Inc. recommends that a construction contract be awarded to Pinholster Construction LLC, dba PINCO, for the base bid minus the items associated with the use of 10-inch casing and screen, plus Alternate Bid Item 2 at a Contract Price of \$1,257,897.10. Casing and screen would be 12-inch and the design production would increase to 1,300 GPM or 1,248,000 GPD based on maximum 16-hour usage per day. This would fully utilize the historical maximum safe yield of 1,300 GPM. We will be pleased, after City Council's consideration of this recommendation, to prepare and forward a Notice of Award for execution.
